In person event 1

What: We will be spending the day getting to know each other, starting some community organising training, and looking at some goal setting for your 6 months on the programme. Webinar 1

Jim will be talking about urban environmental change, and how we as communities can take action for nature in our local areas. Interesting links

- The UK's biggest nature challenge with The Wildlife Trusts has now begun! Throughout June, we are challenging people to do one wild thing every day for the whole month. It's not too late to sign up and you can find out more here.
- Vegware has a regular funding opportunity called the Vegware Community Fund, which 'supports sustainability in its widest sense, including the built and natural environment, and community projects, by offering monthly grants or a regular donation of Vegware's eco packaging.' - Our friends at CEMVO have started a podcast, called 'Disrupting the Doughnut of Doom', which will have interviews with people working in Scotland to encourage greater inclusion and diversity in the environmental sector. You can listen to it here.
- The first sighting of a Cetti's warbler in Scotland has happened! This suggests that its range is spreading, which is very exciting. You can read about it here.
- Fonah Bog, which forms part of the Scottish Wildlife Trust's Balgavies Loch Wildlife Reserve, remains the only site in Scotland where a tiny water beetle has been found. The beetle, *hydroporus scalesianus*, is only 2mm in size! Signs of the beetle were found recently, confirming it is still there. You can find out more about the rare sighting here.
